

**\**Arctotis stoechadifolia*****WHITE ARCTOTIS**

**Flowering period:** September–January.**Description:** Prostrate perennial ground-cover to 30 cm high, often covering large areas to the exclusion of native species. Leaves 15–20 cm long, with a covering of white hairs. Flower head held up to 30 cm above the foliage, each head up to 6 cm in diameter.**Pollination:** Open pollinated by a variety of insects.**Distribution:** Locally abundant particularly where used as a dune stabilising species or as a garden escape. Now found from Jurien Bay to Mandurah.**Uses in restoration:** Not to be used in restoration works as a pernicious and difficult to eradicate weed species from South Africa.**Control:** Glyphosate applied to the foliage when the plant is in active growth usually winter to spring.**Notes:** The ground-covering stems root at intervals, enabling the species to occupy large areas of dune and bushland and making eradication difficult.
